Pastorale and Song of the Angels

Pastorale and Song of the Angels, a short Christmas cantata for soprano and tenor soloists, mixed voices (SATB) and small orchestra, was composed in the mid-Seventies and submitted in partial fulfillment of the doctoral program in Sacred Music at Union Theological Seminary in New York City under the supervision of Professor Joseph Goodman. It was first performed Sunday, December 18,1977 by the Sanctus Choir of the Bridgewater Church of the Brethren conducted by Jesse Hopkins. A few years ago Don Gaines, one of the basses in that choir, told me that he recorded the performance with a cassette recorder under his chair! Consequently, he has prepared the full score and parts of this cantata with the Finale Music Notation software program and provided all of the print-outs which are being used this evening. I am grateful to Curtis Nolley and the SVCS, soloists and orchestra for preparing and realizing this second performance. This work is dedicated to my mother, the late Mrs. Rebecca Barr, who always encouraged me.

The cantata opens with an orchestral pastorale followed by the tenor and soprano soloists singing the Biblical narrative from St. Luke after which the chorus sings, "Glory to God in the highest..." and then concludes with Johann Rist's hymn "Break forth, O beauteous heavenly light"

Fantasia on Greensleeves

In Shakespeare's play, *The Merry Wives of Windsor*, Sir John Falstaff says, "Let the sky rain potatoes, let it thunder to the tune of 'Greensleeves,' hail kissing comfits and eringoes..." This prompted Ralph Vaughan Williams to use the Greensleeves melody as in incidental music between acts of Shakespeare's play in a production given in the summer of 1912 at Stratford-upon-Avon. His beautiful modal introduction to this tune has become perhaps his best-known musical signature. In this Fantasia R.V.W. added a middle section using the folk tune, *Lovely Joan* which he collected in Norfolk during 1908. The present orchestration is by Ralph Greaves and was first performed in 1934 by the BBC Symphony, conducted by the composer.

Fantasia on Christmas Carols

This masterful treatment of English Christmas carols presents, respectively, the words and tunes of: *The Truth Sent From Above* (Herefordshire), *Come All You Worthy Gentlemen* (Somerset), and *On Christmas Night* (Sussex). Woven into the musical fabric are tuneful fragments of *The First Nowell* and the *Wassail Bough* (Yorkshire). Two other fragments that listeners tonight may not recognize are: *There Is a Fountain* (Herefordshire), and *The Virgin Unspotted*. This Fantasia was premiered in Hereford Cathedral September 12, 1912, as part of the Three Choirs Festival featuring J. Campbell McInnus, baritone soloist with the London Symphony Orchestra, and conducted by the composer. This work has been aptly described by John Rutter as a handful of rustic carols raised to an "altogether more symphonic level," and by Frank Howes as "this most hearty and mystical Christmas music."


