Curtis Nolley, Artistic Director In his 22nd season as director of the Shenandoah Valley Choral Society, Curtis Nolley leads the distinguished ensemble in its 52nd season. In addition to his responsibilities with the SVCS, Curtis serves as church musician and free-lance choral conductor. For 43 years he served as music educator serving students as choral director and music

specialist at every level. For 27 years he taught at the elementary, middle and secondary levels in Augusta County and was named the division Teacher of the Year in 2000. Curtis then served a five-year tenure as choral director at Turner Ashby High School in Rockingham County, eleven years as Music Specialist in Harrisonburg City Public Schools, and a two-year assignment as Visiting Director of Choral Music at Bridgewater College. Curtis continues to serve as choir director at Bridgewater Church of the Brethren. In 2012, Curtis was the recipient of the Virginia Choral Director Association's Sydney Swiggett Award for outstanding service and contribution to choral music education in the Commonwealth, and in 2014, the James Madison University Professional Service Award recognizing outstanding service to the music education profession and James Madison University. A native of the Shenandoah Valley, Curtis holds a BA in Music Education from Bridgewater College and a MM in Choral Conducting from the University of Colorado, Boulder. Curtis is active as an adjudicator and guest conductor for scholastic festival choirs across the state of Virginia. An active leader in music education, Curtis is a past president of the Virginia Elementary Music Educators Association and the Virginia Music Educators Association. He continues to serve on VMEA's executive board.



Amy Robertson, accompanist, has been piano accompanist for the SVCS since 1996. She is also a freelance and staff accompanist at James Madison University and teaches privately. She lives with her family in Port Republic, Virginia. Amy holds a BA in Piano Performance with an emphasis in accompanying and coaching, and a Masters in Piano Performance from James Madison University. She has been a featured soloist with the Prince William Symphony Orchestra

and a finalist in the Hilton Head Island International Competition. In 1997, Amy premiered a piece for cello and piano at the Mid-Atlantic Chapter annual meeting of the College Music Society. In 2000, she auditioned for and attended the American Institute of Music Studies program in Graz, Austria. While there, Amy focused her studies on German Lied and accompanied vocalists in local concerts.



Debbie McGuire, accompanist, serves as assistant accompanist and sings with her fellow altos in the SVCS. She is a professional freelance accompanist who has worked with church, school, and collegiate performance ensembles throughout Virginia. She has taught at Mary Baldwin College and served as piano instructor at Stuart Hall School in Staunton, Virginia. In addition to her service with the SVCS, she has served as guest accompanist for scholastic festival choral ensembles throughout the region. Ms. McGuire is a graduate of the University of Richmond and received her Master's Degree in Church Music from Southern Baptist Theo-

logical Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky. Her private studio and residence is in Rockingham County, Virginia.

Dr. Larry Taylor, organ, is professor of music at Bridgewater College in Bridgewater, Virginia where he teaches courses in music theory and history and gives lessons in organ and piano. Dr. Taylor holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in organ from the University of Cincinnati (where he won the Strader Organ Competition), Master of Music degrees from Emory University and Notre Dame, and a Bachelor of Music degree from Seton Hill University in Greensburg, Pennsylvania. In addition to performances of classical repertoire on piano and organ, Dr. Taylor has arranged and performed organ accompaniments to



more than twenty classic silent films with a focus on the comedies of Buster Keaton and Harold Lloyd.

As a composer, Dr. Taylor has collaborated frequently with poet Tom Noe to produce anthems, cantatas, the one-woman opera Marie Curie and the two-act opera Eros and Psyche. They are currently collaborating on a new opera, The Dickinsons of Amherst, which tells the story of a scandal in Emily Dickinson's family that had an impact on her legacy. He has also composed arrangements for symphonic band and chorus as well as solo organ works. His art songs have been featured as part of the Bridgewater International Poetry Festival. In 2015 he won the Faculty Scholarship Award at Bridgewater College.

Blessing Ogbor, Mezzo Soprano

Blessing was born and raised in Lagon, Nigeria. She has always loved music and started singing in the children's choir in church and later joined a contemporary gospel band in her teens. As much as she intended studying music after high school, she did not have the opportunity and had to study computer science. After completing her undergraduate degree in computer science, she kept singing and learning music from teachers around her. The following year she won the regional All-Stars competition for her category in Lagos earning her a scholarship to study music at the Mountaintop Conservatory of Music, Lagos, Nige-



ria. She took courses in music and sat for the United Kingdom's Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music exams in voice earning distinctions in both practical and theory.

Blessing has performed various opera scenes from Mozart's *La Clemenza di Tito* playing the role of Sesto, and Bizet's *Carmen* playing the role of Carmen. She has also been featured as narrator in the musical *Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*, and alto roles in Handel oratorios, *Esther, Messiah*, and *Judas Maccabeus*, as well as Mendelssohn's *Elijah*. She is currently studying for her master's degree in vocal performance at James Madison University.



Michael D. Richardson, Baritone

A doctoral candidate at James Madison University, Michael is studying under the tutelage of Kevin McMillan, with whom he completed a Master's Degree. Michael completed his Bachelor's at Buena Vista University under Dr. Merrin Guice-Gill.

Michael was the 1st place winner in the Classical Upper Advanced Men's category at the 2019 National Association of Teachers of Singing (NATS) Competition and also was an Encour-

agement Award Recipient in the Metropolitan Opera National Competition Districts 2019.

Recent operatic roles include the role of William Putnam in Jake Hagee's opera *If I Were You* at the Nightingale Opera Theater in 2022. In James Madison University opera productions, notable roles are those of Nick Shadow in Igor Stravinsky's *The Rake's Progress* in 2022; Leporello in Mozart's *Don Giovanni* in 2021; Papageno in *Die Zauberflöte* in 2020; Mephistopheles in *Faust* in 2019; and George Benton in *Dead Man Walking* in 2018. He performed Gianni Schicchi in *Gianni Schicchi* at Buena Vista University Opera in 2017.

In the concert sphere, Michael was a soloist in 2019 in the JMU Wind Symphony's rendition of *Porgy & Bess'* 'Catfish Row' and in Haydn's *Creation*.

Program Notes

Requiem

Maurice Duruflé (1902-1986)

In 1947 the French publishing company Durand commissioned Maurice Duruflé to compose a Requiem Mass. Since he had already begun to write an organ suite based on Gregorian chant themes, Duruflé decided to use this work as a basis for the commission. The result was the composer's first choral work: a Requiem with an application of medieval melody, contemporary harmonization, and comforting treatment of the subject matter.

Duruflé wrote very few original melodies for this piece, but instead used Gregorian chant in a twentieth-century harmonic setting. The Requiem Mass has often been set to music, but Duruflé was the first to incorporate the Gregorian chants, traditionally associated with the religious ceremonies of the Mass for the Dead, into the core of the entire composition's musical framework.

Our performance uses Duruflé's 1947 organ version of the score (there are also versions for full orchestra and for organ and strings). This is not just an orchestral reduction, but a fully realized, highly virtuosic organ piece drawing on Duruflé's extensive experience as an organist. He studied in the 1920s with the organ master Louis Vierne and worked for most of his life as the organist at St. Etienne-du Mont in Paris.

Meticulously written, Duruflé's contemporary setting of the *Requiem* text fuses Gregorian chant with 20th century concepts and weaves an embracing, almost cosmic tapestry of human emotion — from peaks of ecstatic joy to more reflective moments. It's a gentle, hopeful requiem that speaks eloquently to today's universal yearnings.

Program Notes

Dolly, Op, 56

Gabriel Fauré (1845-1924)

Gabriel Fauré didn't like giving his works revealing names. He once said that he'd rather name every work 'Piano Piece No. ...' than commit to a name. Commercialization in the person of his publisher defeated him and so we have works with titles that help us understand what he meant in a composition.

One work, however, that Fauré did give titles to were the six pieces that make up his *Dolly* suite. The pieces were written for the daughter of his mistress, Hélène Bardac (1892–1985), who was known to her family as Dolly.

All works, however, despite being intended for a specific recipient, were not necessarily new. The first piece, a lullaby entitled *Berceuse*, had actually been written some 30 years earlier for another daughter of another friend. The original title had been *La Chanson dans le jardin* (The song in the garden). The work was presented for Dolly's first birthday.

New Year's day 1895 was celebrated by the third work, *Le jardin de Dolly* (Dolly's Garden). This work, despite the weather of the season, takes us outdoors with its enchanting music of nature. A phrase from Fauré's first violin sonata, written some 20 years earlier, appears in the work. Although *Berceuse* might be the best-known movement of the suite, it is this garden piece that many consider the brilliant jewel at the heart of the suite.

In this program we recognize and appreciate the talent and dedication of our gifted accompanists, Amy Robertson and Debbie McGuire. They have delighted our audiences and supported the SVCS membership with their artistry and commitment. Once again, they grace us with the beauty of their piano-4-hands collaboration. Thank you!

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
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
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
